I come representing people who have witnessed road trauma and who have experienced a range of thoughts and feelings that can be difficult to process. (Brief silence)

(ALL) We remember and support with care everyone affected by road trauma, who are weighed down by the sadness of what they have seen, heard and experienced. We remember them.

EMERGENCY SERVICES Glenn Weir

I come representing the emergency services – Ambulance, Fire Services, State Emergency Service and Victoria Police. Members see the impact of road trauma and do all they can to support the community. (Brief silence)

(ALL) We acknowledge with gratitude the skills, knowledge and compassion of emergency service workers, past and present, and their deep commitment to the community. We remember them.

HEALTH AND HEALING SERVICES Daniel Fabris

I come representing those who offer physical, emotional and spiritual support for people impacted by road trauma. We acknowledge people's pain and suffering, and together work towards adapting to the loss and changes they face. (Brief silence)

(ALL) We remember with thankfulness the skill and dedication of all health care professionals who treat and support those injured in body, mind and spirit. We appreciate them as they use their knowledge and skills to optimise health and instil hope for the future. We remember them.

THE LAW Stuart Le Grand

I come representing those involved in the making and administration of our laws. Through the law we seek to promote justice and responsible behaviour in all who use our roads, and we strive for fair outcomes. (Brief silence)

(ALL) We remember and respect those whose responsibility it is to make and administer laws for the sake of us all. We thank them for their wisdom in making decisions that help shape a just, caring and responsible community. We remember them.
